Dr. Huber said that the Community Free Clinic is dedicated to providing excellent free medical care to those in our community without access to healthcare benefits. Many local physicians donate their time to see patients who have no health insurance and who cannot otherwise afford to be seen by a doctor.

Their new spacious site was made possible by a generous donation local family who wishes to remain anonymous. The clinic provides health and lab services as well as a dispensary where prescriptions are filled. The clinic provides primarily generic prescriptions but some name brands are provided by the manufacturers.

The staff at the Clinic sees patients who do not have access to medical benefits through their employment or any social services program. This includes: those who experience financial hardship; those temporarily receiving unemployment benefits but enrolled in training programs; those employed in seasonal or part-time work who are in the process or applying for, but have not yet received benefits; and residents of the Downtown Rescue Mission, Salvation Army, HOPE Place and other shelters.
