Fabiani Duarte reported that there is a lot of action in setting up and activating our JOOI Clubs. He urged members of the Club to attend as many of these events as possible. The schedule of JOOI Club events is given at the end of the bulletin.

Program



Program Chairman Fabiani Duarte introduced today's speaker, Ms. Bobby Bradley, co-founder and CEO of Village of Promise. Ms. Jennifer Cash, a staff member of Village of Promise, was also in attendance. Ms. Bradley showed a short video which described in a general way how the organization and its partners are fighting poverty in Huntsville.

Ms. Bradley gave the mission of Village of Promise: *Eradicate poverty one neighborhood at a time*. She recounted how she became involved in fighting poverty, beginning in 2002 when she learned of the work being done in Lincoln Village. Later, she learned of a program in New York City, The Harlem Children Zone, which had achieved noteworthy success in breaking the poverty cycle of families there. She also cited her own upbringing in Huntsville as a model for success. After starting an interest group to investigate options for fighting poverty in 2009, she co-founded the Village of Promise as a non-profit corporation in January of 2011. The organization's vision is to provide a pipeline of services from pre-natal to college, beginning with one neighborhood in Huntsville.

The four principles governing their efforts are:

- (1) Focus first on one neighborhood, starting at the elementary school level
- (2) Use only "best-practice" programs, i.e., those that have proven to work
- (3) Improve the neighborhood by partnering with other organizations & volunteers
- (4) Maintain accountability of kids in the program; track their progress and improvements

The neighborhood selected is that around University

Place Elementary School which feeds into Westlawn Middle School and Butler High School. Their goal is to have every child in this neighborhood <u>ready</u> for college, recognizing that some will prefer trade school or the military.

She next described the "nuts & bolts" of how the Village of Promise works. The biggest need of kids in the University Place neighborhood is reading improvement, so a big effort goes into providing tutors to help these kids to read at a higher level. There is both an in-school

and after school tutoring in both reading and mathematics.

Also, recognizing a correlation between music and learning, another project is providing violin instruction to every 2nd grader at University Place Elementary School. A third project undertaken was planting an outdoor garden near the school so kids could learn where their food comes from. The garden has also been folded into the science curriculum at the school.

Two future efforts are planned:

- (1) The "Infant University" wherein new mothers are taught how to provide early education at home to small children, and
- (2) "Freedom School," a six-week program that makes learning and reading <u>fun</u>.

Ms. Bradley concluded her talk by relating three things that we, as a club or as individuals, could do to help the Village of Promise:

- (1) Pray for the organization.
- (2) Visit the organization's web site, www.villagepromise.com
- (3) Get involved as a volunteer.

She said they would be happy to host anyone from our Club at University Place School to see first-hand what they are doing.

Closing

Tom Casteel won the attendance prize on the first drawing. Dr. Carl Winkler led in the recitation of the Optimist Creed to close the meeting.
