a JOOI Club there. Members of the Ambassadors Club will form the JOOI Club leadership and then recruit new members for the JOOI Club. Election of JOOI Club officers was set for next Wednesday, and the new JOOI Club is expected to be up and running by the end of March. One of the projects of the new club will be to work with *Semper Fi* to televise local school sports news.

Fabiani also reported that he will be attending the JOOI Club District Convention this weekend. There will be 8 students and 2 advisors from our local JOOI Clubs (Morris Elementary, Chapman School, and Columbia High School), also attending.

## Program



Alberto Duarte introduced our speaker for today, Ms. Mary Flynn of the Hawthorne Conservatory. After giving her biographical information leading up to joining the Conservatory, Alberto presented her a check for \$2,105.13, the profit from the recent pancake breakfast.

Ms. Flynn began her talk by saying she

couldn't have been more delighted in how the recent pancake breakfast was conducted. She was happy to see so many familiar faces from our Club, and was very impressed with the conduct of the Chapman JOOI Club members who assisted us that day.

The Conservatory was founded in 1996 from an endowment by Marguerite Hawthorne, and is an arm of the Central Presbyterian Church. The mission of the conservatory is to provide free music lessons and, in many cases, musical instruments to children who could not otherwise learn to play a musical instrument. At this time there are 65 students at the conservatory, and each student receives a private one-on-on music lesson each week. Currently, lessons are given in piano, flute, violin and trumpet by a staff of highly skilled musicians, including Ms. Flynn.

Ms. Flynn has been director of the conservatory since 2003. She told how rewarding and satisfying it has been for her to be a part of Hawthorne Conservatory. She recounted some heart-warming stories of several students who had begun their music instruction at the conservatory. Four of these students now have a <u>full</u> (all tuition paid) scholarship to universities, including one at Vanderbilt. She said there are many benefits to be derived from studying music:

- 🖊 It instills discipline into a person's work ethic
- It increases the joy of living
- 🖊 It promotes cultural awareness and understanding

Ms. Flynn closed her talk by expressing her great appreciation to the Optimist Club for their long and continued support for the Hawthorne Conservatory. Our Club provided the first piano for the conservatory, a \$12,000 Yamaha upright piano in 1996, and funds from a later pancake breakfast were used to buy another piano, some trumpets and all the violins needed to begin the violin instruction. Her hope is to begin cello instruction with the Club's latest contribution.

In answer to a question, Ms. Flynn said the conservatory will sponsor two recitals in May. She will inform our Club on the dates and times when they are set.

## Closing

In the absence of President Casteel, who has the tin with the numbers in it, there was no drawing for the attendance prize today. VP McDonough asked Al Renz to collect the money for enriching next week's attendance prize.

Dr. Carl Winkler led in the recitation of the Optimist Creed to close the meeting.
