he had about 30 refurbished instruments in his garage (due to the lack of space in our closet at the ORC), and Band Committee Chairman Al Adams said he had just received 15 instruments (clarinets, flutes and trumpets) back from Robbins Music, and they are in the ORC closet. Al asked committee members to be sure to list the instruments taken from the closet on the sign-out sheet there.

Program



Program Chairman Bill Peters introduced Chris Crumbly, Advanced Development Manager for the Space Launch System (SLS) at Marshall Space Flight Center. He and our speaker had worked together on

the Spacelab program several years ago. Mr. Crumbly had held various positions within NASA before taking his present position.

Mr. Crumbly opened his program by relating the SLS to Captain Cook's ship, the Endeavor. As with Captain Cook, we don't know what discoveries the SLS's future voyages will make, or even where missions will go. He quoted: "Ships of exploration shouldn't limit destinations, they should open opportunities."

He said the SLS is taller and more powerful than any previous NASA launch vehicles, including the Saturn V Moon Rocket, although it lacks a little in matching it in payload capability.

Mr. Crumbly had brought with him a scale model of the SLS, and he gave a brief description of each component of the SLS, beginning with the Orion Spacecraft at the top and working down the vehicle to the booster rockets and their engines.

The current budget uncertainty, along with the difference of opinion on NASA programs between the White House and Congress, make any schedule projections a matter of conjecture, but Mr. Crumbly gave these tentative schedule milestones:

- o 2014—Unmanned launch of the Orion capsule on a Delta IV rocket to test the heat shield
- o 2017—Launch of the Orion capsule into a retrograde orbit, close to the Moon.
- 2021—Manned launch of the Orion capsule into a similar retrograde orbit, with the possible landing on an Asteroid (as a precursor to an Asteroid redirect mission).
- o 2030—Landing on the moons of Mars.

Mr. Crumbly reported how the current budget battles (sequestration & potential for budget by continuing resolution) have produced a "crazy situation" for planning. His emphasis now is on making a more affordable, safer and reliable vehicle. As examples, his office is looking at more efficient manufacturing processes and using electrical actuators in place of hydraulic actuators for thrust vector control. He also showed a titanium engine impeller that had been made by laser manufacturing, a new process where the part is manufactured by essentially thousands upon thousands of tiny welds in a container of titanium powder. He said manufacturing this part this way takes 9 hours versus 9 months by the traditional casting processes.
