Program



February Program Chairman Jim Berry introduced today's speaker, Bill Friday. Bill is a long-time friend of Jim, and was a charter member of the Aldersgate United Methodist Church on Bailey Cove that Rev. Berry was instrumental in founding. Mr. Friday is a retired U.S. Army physicist with a Master of Science from UAH. Mr. Friday read a prepared talk to accompany his PowerPoint slides entitled "How Did We Get Here, and Are We Alone?" He began his talk by reading a selection from Genesis, Chapter 1. (He later concluded this passage was borrowed from some ancient Mesopotamian texts). From there he reviewed the theory of evolution using the DNA double helix molecule and its role in what we look like and how we relate to other forms of animal life.

Mr. Friday's has concluded that it all started some 4.5 billion years ago with the Big Bang; in fact, he said there have been an infinite number of Big Bangs. Sometime later, life that was floating around in our solar system when earth's water was formed was fortuitously brought to Earth by a meteorite. This formed the primordial slime from which we all have evolved.

In conclusion, he asked, "Where does God fit in all of this?" He said, "I cannot answer." But he did say that "Creation is evolution done the fun way." In response to a question, Mr. Friday said he believes the universe *is* expanding; the only question is whether the rate of expansion is accelerating or decelerating. I'm sure there were plenty of other questions from those of us who believe in the inerrancy and literal interpretation of the Bible, and I suggest it would be fair and proper to have a speaker give a talk on Biblical creation at a future meeting.

Closing

President George McDonough thanked our speaker, and gave him a coaster with the Optimist Creed on it. Mr. Friday drew for our attendance prize, and Al Renz one on the second drawing (Darrel McColgan missed out).

Dr. Carl Winkler closed the meeting by leading us in the reciting the Optimist Creed.
