Program



President George McDonough called on February Program Chairman Jim Berry to introduce today's speaker, Jonathan Shields.

Jim said he had attended the Martin Luther King Breakfast earlier this month,

and the wrap-up talk at that occasion was an elegant and inspirational talk given by our speaker. Jonathan is a senior at Buckhorn High School, and is president of the Student Government Association there. He has been on the A Honor Roll since fifth grade. He plans to attend the University of Alabama in Huntsville and major in Computer Science. Jonathan flawlessly delivered his talk without reading or resorting to his notes. He began by thanking the Club for inviting him, and said he was honored to speak again about Martin Luther King's role in bringing civil rights to all Americans 50 years ago. He said although he wasn't born when Dr. King was alive, he is enjoying the benefits of civil rights earned by the high price and sacrifice of Dr. King.

Jonathan quoted a passage from one of Dr. King's speeches wherein Dr. King used the images of (1) a chart, (2) a compass, and (3) the North Star. He then explained that the *chart* gives us data points on the rights already earned by civil rights activists; the *compass* gives us direction for making the best use of these rights—especially through getting the best education possible—and the *North Star* that shows us the right direction to travel using high morals, integrity, good manners, and the wheels of justice.

The Club gave Jonathan a standing ovation, and he was encouraged to participate in our upcoming oratorical contest.

Closing

President George McDonough thanked our speaker, and gave him a coaster with the Optimist Creed on it. After drawing three names (Milt Williams, Jim Pepper, and Bob Martin) of non-attendees, Jonathan said he felt like he wasn't doing a good job, but the attendees disagreed and encouraged him to keep on drawing. Bill Peters' was the next name drawn, and he took home the attendance prize.

Dr. Carl Winkler closed the meeting by leading us in the reciting the Optimist Creed.
