President George McDonough reported on **Zack Thompson's funeral**, saying it was one of the "good ones" he's attended. Included in the funeral program was the Optimist Creed, and the minister led the entire assemblage in reciting our creed as part of the service.

Zack was on a senior citizen's bus trip with about 30 others from the First Baptist Church. At their stop in Flagstaff, AZ (elevation: 7,000 ft.), Zack experienced symptoms of altitude sickness which Betty, his wife, said he had experienced in the past. Zack felt bad enough to forego the scheduled trip to the southern rim of the Grand Canyon, and stayed in the hotel for the day. The next morning while eating breakfast he suffered a fatal heart attack.

The Club is planning to honor Zack at a future meeting (see announcements, below).

Treasurer's Report



Treasurer Al Renz went over his October-April (7-month) report, a copy of which was provided to each attendee. He highlighted the following items from his quarterly summary report:

• There were a number of expenses in the Youth Activities this past month: The Youth Appreciation Banquet, Essay Contest awards, and Band Instrument Program, all of which are reimbursable from the Foundation

• The Club treasury is gradually acquiring a small reserve. This has come about due to the lower cost of meals at Mullins, a \$1,000 award from Optimist International, and a donation

• Our bank balance at the end of April was \$1,845.36. There are a number of outstanding dues, amounting to \$1,625.

• The Club has received its first payment from Jeff Klimek. A U. S. Government check for \$175 was received from the Federal Court in Birmingham. There was no elaboration on how the amount was arrived at, and Al has written the Court for some explanation. A copy of the check was passed around for us to see.

President George McDonough thanked Committee Chair Gay Pepper and her committee for an outstanding Youth Appreciation Banquet. He also asked Al Adams to thank his wife for providing a

facility and helping with the table decorations.

Respect for Law Banquet

Tom Casteel reported that a clean, climate-controlled storage room had been rented, at a very reasonable cost, to store our ever increasing inventory of band instruments. The room is in a facility located at 2501 University Drive just west of the Parkway.

The band committee will assemble there at 11:00 a.m. this Saturday to assemble shelves for storing the instruments. There is also enough space for a 6-ft. table and 8 chairs in the room.

Foundation Report



Foundation President Tom Casteel reported that at the end of April, the balance in the Foundation's Account at Regions Bank was \$878,887.56, down just a little from last month.

New Club Formation



Our newest and youngest member Andrew Driver and Tom Casteel are working hard to get a College Optimist Club established at Calhoun Community College. A kick-off meeting and one informational meeting have already been held. Seven young people have submitted membership applications. They are very excited about the prospect, and are already identifying potential club projects.

Their goal is to charter the new club at Calhoun by July 1. Twenty-five members are needed to form an official club. A College Club is like a regular Optimist Club, but with reduced entry fee and dues.


The Club is also considering raising funds for an as yet undefined memorial project. The board welcomes your ideas on both how to raise funds, and what sort of project would be appropriate.
