
Bob Martin again asked for inputs on where we might hold our **Christmas party** this year. He said someone had suggested holding it at Mullins, but this produced an audible negative reaction. Gay Pepper volunteered to help Bob locate a more suitable place.

Treasurer Al Renz passed out the **dues statements** for this quarter to those in attendance. Paying your dues early will help the Club's cash flow.

Program

President Al Adams said no introduction was needed for today's speaker, our own Optimist George McDonough. George stated that Dr. Zaheer Kahn was slated to speak, but had to cancel due to 14 of his patients being in the hospital. He said his "plan B" was to talk about his role in the developing the configuration for NASA's Skylab. Bill Peter's talks on Skylab last month had stimulated memories that he would like to share with us, even though he was a little embarrassed about talking a lot about himself.

George related that the systems engineering discipline was not a strong point of Marshall Space Flight Center in the early 1960s. Recognizing this, MSFC started an Apollo Applications Program and formed a new Systems Engineering organization. Two new missions were defined by this new organization: A solar observatory called the Apollo Telescope Mount, and a manned Orbital Workshop (space station). The plan was for both of these missions to be launched separately on a Saturn 1B rocket. George was plucked from his job as Deputy Division Chief to head up an effort to combine both of these programs into a single Saturn V launch.



During months of meetings and presentations, George slogged his way through a minefield of jealousy between NASA centers and doubters of technical feasibility to derive an acceptable configuration to be called Skylab. He described how influential Dr. Wernher von Braun was in those days, and how Dr. von Braun's knowledge, charisma and political skills always dictated the outcome of his meetings.

In the end, Dr. George E. Mueller, head of NASA Manned Space Flight missions at NASA Headquarters decided the basic arrangement of Skylab modules. He dictated the final configuration with a sketch on a blackboard, and this sketch was

fortunately captured for posterity by a photograph.

The end of the story, George said, was that he was "fired" once the configuration for Skylab was settled. He opined that he had made too many enemies along the way. His new position was Technical Director of Science and Engineering with a budget of five million dollars for worthy projects. This made him a lot of friends from those who needed money for their ideas.

Closing

President Al Adams asked our guest, Ms. Ingram, to draw a winning name for our attendance prize. She drew Duane Plank's name on the first drawing.

Dr. Carl Winkler led us in the reciting the Optimist Creed to close the meeting.
