Today's Meeting Mullins Restaurant

Our guests were a mixture of actual guests and a couple who are slated to be new members. Guests were Dr. Malinda Gilmore, Special Asst. to the President for Special Initiatives; Alex Thompson, guest of Rebecca Billings; Michelle Williams, wife of Vastell; and "Aunt Maria & Cousin Gloria," guests of Alberto Duarte from Colombia. I understand that two other guests, Rebecca Billings and Matt Clarke, are to become members of the Club.

The service at Mullins was unusually slow and inefficient today. I didn't get my meal (along with a great majority of others) until Dr. Hugine began his talk, so I couldn't both take notes and eat. Also, there was no offer to refill drinks. Perhaps of most importance, Dr. Hugine had to suspend his talk on at least two occasions because of the noise made by servers. wanted one of our instruments. Tom said he had two schools that needed a Club member as contact, and he invited new members to get involved in this dynamic program. He said we now have 22 schools in the program.

Program



President Al Adams introduced our speaker for today, Dr. Andrew Hugine, Jr., President of Alabama A & M University. The thing that struck me most about his introduction was that Dr. Hugine has a B. S. and M. S. in mathematics (from South Caroline State

University) and has mathematics text books. His PhD is in Higher Education, authored three awarded by Michigan State University.

Dr. Hugine began his talk by complementing our Club on the programs we do for youth. He quoted a former colleague who said that "Youth are about 25% of today's population, but will be 100% of tomorrow's population."

Dr. Hugine's talk covered the origins of the University, the current status of the University, and plans for the future of the University. As I mentioned above, I wasn't able to take my usual detailed notes because of the late food service, so you'll have to be content with several of the most interesting tidbits I was able to jot down between bites of my lunch.

Origin of Alabama A & M

- Established in 1875, just 10 years after the Emancipation Proclamation. The first President was William Hooper Councill, a former slave.
- It is one of two land-grant institutions in Alabama, the other being Auburn.
- A & M has the oldest Computer Science program of any State University.

Today's Alabama A & M

- The University has 66 programs: 40 baccalaureates, 18 masters, 1 educational specialist and 4 doctorates
- Has about 5,000 students, about 4,000 undergraduates and about 1,000 graduate students
- The top counties in Alabama for enrolled undergraduate students at A & M are: Madison, Jefferson, Mobile, and Montgomery
- The top states sending students to A & M are Alabama, Georgia, Tennessee and Mississippi.
- A & M has about 800 full-time employees, of which 242 are full-time faculty members.
- One interesting program is designed to instruct physics teachers how to make physics both interesting and understandable through hands-on experiments and such.
- Another interesting program at A & M is the study of diseases of bats (they are very important in keeping insect population under control).
- A & M is second in the nation in providing doctorates in agriculture to minority students, and in the top 15 in teaching science, technology, engineering and mathematics to minorities.
- Twenty-seven percent of the budget for A & M comes from the State of Alabama (paid for by taxpayers).

- Alabama A & M receives about the same allocation from the State (about \$40 million) per year now as it did 10 years ago.
- The athletics program at A & M is not self-supporting, financially, as are the very great majority of university athletic programs in the U. S.

The Future of A & M

Dr. Malinda Gilmore (one of our guests, today) has put together a strategic plan for the future, with the objectives to:

- Enhance A & M's distinctiveness and competitiveness
- Strengthen structures, operations and systems
- Upgrade the University's infrastructure and facilities
- Secure the University's financial future
- Enhance the University's image and recognition
- Expand the University's outreach

Dr. Hugine concluded his talk by reminded the Club that we taxpayers are supporting Alabama A & M, so we should be considered supporters of the University. He encouraged us to visit the University and get a first-hand look at what is going on there.

Dr. Hugine said the University would be delighted to host one of our Optimist Club meetings on the campus sometime soon.

Closing

President Al gave a tile with the Optimist to Dr. Hugine, and asked him to draw for our attendance prize. Alberto Duarte was the first name drawn.

Dr. Carl Winkler led us in the reciting the Optimist Creed.
