Program



President Al Adams said we were grateful and honored to have Sheriff Blake Dorning as speaker today to bring us news about the Madison County Sheriff's Dept., as he does every year.

Al said, "He's a member of our Club, and needs no further introduction. Here's the Sheriff."

Sheriff Dorning began his talk by reviewing his career with the Madison Count Sheriff's Department. He joined the Department in 1983 as a Corrections Officer, and is now in his 33rd year there. He was first elected as Sheriff in 2002, and has been re-elected to that office ever since.

Technology

Technology continues to be in the forefront in the Sheriff's Department. Madison County was the first county in Alabama to utilize Mobile Data Terminals in patrol cars. One of the newest technology tools is Crime Mapping, whereby crime "hot spots" are identified so Sheriff's Deputies can give them closer attention.

Sheriff's Department is now totally paperless—including Pistol Permits. If you want to get a pistol permit, you will need to fill out your application on line. If you lack a computer to do this, you may make an appointment with ladies in the Department who will fill out your application for you. The Sheriff said in a typical month there are 5,000 applications for new or renewed Pistol Permits in the County. He said there is always a spike in permit applications following a terrorist incident, such as the recent one in San Bernardino, CA.

Another new technology being put in place is a Facial Recognition System. The Department is one of the first in the country to employ this technology. With this system, the Sheriff said that even identical twins can be distinguished from each other.

The Sheriff's Department is also up to speed in social media. They use Facebook, Twitter and Snapchat, and have a "very aggressive" web site. Sheriff Dorning reported that people booked into jail are quickly put into a register on the web site. Anyone can go to the web site, click on the jail link, and scroll through to see all the prisoners currently in the jail.

Personnel

The Sheriff's Department has a Cadet Corps. Cadets generally meet once each month, but can meet once a week for training. After they pass their 16th birthday, they are eligible to ride with a Sheriff's Deputy on patrol.

It's getting harder and harder to recruit good men and women to become Sheriff's Deputies, he said. Not many young people in today's culture have "a heart for service. Community service is not high on people's agendas any more.

Keeping a full staff of Deputies is a continual problem. His Department is losing Deputies to private industry, because they have valuable training and can get a raise. The have become, he said "a high commodity." Verison, for example, has recruited several Corrections Officers because of their skill in calming frayed nerves with their voices.

Sheriff Dorning said he makes an effort to improve the quality of his Deputies whenever he can. He said he is "a book man," and he always gives a book to a Deputy when he/she is promoted. He currently gives a book entitled "Cowboy Ethics" which promotes integrity, hard work, and a good image to be striven for. Readers of the book are encouraged to well represent the outfit they work for, or in cowboy talk, "I ride for that brand."

In response to a question by Al Renz, Sheriff Dorning said the disparity in salaries between Madison County Deputies and other local law enforcement agencies has been closed. However, the raise for the Deputies did not apply to Corrections Officers, and the result is that the Jail is currently understaffed. Auburn University has done a study showing that the Madison County Correction Officers' salaries are in the bottom 10 %.

In closing, Sheriff Dorning read a passage from the Book of Isaiah in the Old Testament which emphasizes that in tough times God is always there. All we have to do is "move and not be still." He said Duane Plank was a man that "warmed his heart" whenever they talked. Duane was a bundle of enthusiasm, and was always beating the drum to "Be your best!" He encouraged our Club to follow Duane's example. "Just go! Do it! Make the effort!"

Closing

President Al Adams said the Sheriff was disqualified from drawing for the attendance prize because he was a member. He asked Elaine Plank to do the honor. Sheriff Dorning contributed five Sheriff's Department lapel pins as additional drawing prizes.

Elaine first drew Kathy Anderson's name for the attendance prize; Kathy wasn't present, but the second name drawn, Jim Berry, was. (Jim donated all of his winnings to our Childhood Cancer fund). Alberto Duarte, Clyde Nevins, Marilyn King-Jordan, Al Renz and Trent Plank took home the lapel pins.

Tom Casteel led the Club in reciting the Optimist Creed to close the meeting.
