We the People, in the summer of 1819, forty-four delegates met in Huntsville to draft Alabama's first constitution, the defining document that provided the framework for the state's government and made Alabama the 22nd of the United States. Two hundred years later, the Constitution of 1819 is returning to the city as part of a special bicentennial exhibition curated by the Alabama Department of Archives and History (ADAH). The documents have been meticulously restored and will be on view outside of Montgomery for the first time at the Huntsville Museum of Art, 300 Church Street South, from June 30th to August 11th.
