Fabiani introduced the program speakers: Ms. Anna Manning, Director of Community Events for the Huntsville Hospital Foundation, and Ms. Traci Conley, Nurse Educator for the Neonatal ICU at the Huntsville Women's and Children's Hospital.

Ms. Manning spoke about the Huntsville Hospital Foundation and the several programs it supports and/or sponsors such as the Heart Shot Tennis Event in February, the Huntsville Classic Dinner & Golf Tournament in May, and the Liz Hurley Ribbon Run in October. She recounted the story of Amy and Chris George's founding the Melissa George Neonatal Fund after the loss of one of their twin daughter, Melissa Suzanne George in 2005. Since then the Melissa George Neonatal Memorial Fund has raised \$1,400,000 to support the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit.

She showed a short video on the NICU narrated by Channel 19's Jerry Hayes that brought tears to many eyes (mine, anyway). She stated there is a lot of community support required since Huntsville Hospital is a not-for-profit hospital and receives no tax money. She welcomed the Optimist Club to arrange a tour of the NICU, and also to contribute to the financial support that is needed.

Ms. Conley related how the nurses interact with both the babies and their parents (and other relatives). Most of the babies that come to the NICU are premature, "26 weekers" or later, but they treat others who are there because of physical problems discovered after their birth. There are 137 nurses and four physicians at the NICU which has 45 beds (expandable if necessary to a maximum of 70 beds). There is a Neonatal Transportation team which has brought babies to the NICU from as far away as Cullman.

. She reported that of those delivered at 23 weeks only about 10% survive, while those delivered at 24 weeks have a 50-50 chance of survival. Babies as small as 13 ounces have been treated in the NICU. She told how the health of mothers has deteriorated in recent years; many more are smoking and using drugs than in past years. Parents of babies who do not survive are given special treatment to ease their pain.

Tom Casteel and Jim & Gay Pepper have had grandchildren treated at the NICU, and both spoke very highly of their experience there.

Ms. Conley drew names for the door prize. Chev Kellogg and Joe Pullen missed out, so Duane Plank pocketed the money.
