# Program



Milt Williams introduced our speaker for today's meeting, Ms. Lee Marshall. Ms. Marshall is the founder of Kids to Love Foundation, a non-profit agency established to meet the needs of foster children in Alabama and parts of Tennessee.

Ms. Marshall is a former foster child in Tennessee. She was blessed to have been placed with a "Forever Family" at an early age, and she wants other foster children to experience similar love, stability and a sense of belonging.

Her crusade to care for these children began in 2004 on a local TV channel, WHNT. Her "Kids to Love" reports have introduced children waiting to be adopted. To date, 225 kids have been profiled and 195 of these have found their "forever families." Kids to Love profiles are shown on WHNT, channel 19, during the 5 p.m. newscast on Mondays.

The mission of the Kids to Love Foundation is to meet the needs of foster children while they wait for permanent homes. Since 2004, the Kids to Love Foundation has directly impacted the lives of more than 75,000 foster children.

One of the most important projects of Kids to Love is to provide school supplies for foster children. This project began in the garage of Ms. Marshall's home in 2005, and has now grown to where it requires large warehouse space and trucks (both of which are fully donated) to distribute these supplies. Last year over one million dollars in in-kind of support was received.



Another important project was starting the web site "See Meth Stop Meth." The web site takes tips on where meth labs are known or suspected to be operating. This project was begun because of the frequency of foster children coming from homes containing meth labs. To date, over 3,000 tips have been received from 37 states and

Australia. Ms. Marshall said she had resisted offers of law enforcement take-over of this site because she wants to keep the focus on removing children from meth lab environments.

Another project provides Christmas gifts to over 1,000 kids each year. Kids to Love publishes a Christmas "Wish List" every year, and volunteers sign up to fill the needs. Also, 300 college scholarships have been sponsored by the organization

A short questions-and-answer session followed Ms. Marshall's talk. She described the screening process for foster parents, the limited ways that young people can volunteer, and the amount of money foster parents receive for each child taken into their home (\$12 per day).
