
Program, Part I



Oratorical Contest Chairman Alberto Duarte thanked the Optimists who had helped him in putting on the Club's Oratorical Contest last Saturday. He introduced Dr. Sheldon and two of the four

students from UAHuntsville who had judged the competition. Then, he introduced the winner of the Girls' competition, Carla Becker, who gave her winning speech. Upon completion of her talk, Alberto presented her the winner's check of \$300. Following Carla's speech, Connor Diaz gave his winning speech and likewise received his check for \$300.

Program, Part II



Tom Casteel introduced our scheduled speaker for today, Ms. Brenda Hinshaw, Marketing Director for Redstone Village retirement community. Ms. Hinshaw opened her talk by saying

her main goal was to encourage us to start thinking, planning and documenting our desires for health care when we are no longer able to care for ourselves. She related how many people wait too late, and come in a crisis situation after a fall or stroke has incapacitated a loved one.

Ms. Hinshaw reviewed the various senior living options as follows:

- Home Health Care
- Senior Apartments
- Continuing Care Retirement Community

- Independent Living
- Assisted Living
- Specialty Care Assisted Living
- Skilled Nursing

She emphasized the high cost and lack of dependability in hiring caregivers for home health care, and that a "nursing home" is not the only option available in today's environment. Senior apartments are fine for those who do not need assistance, but if specialty care or assisted living becomes necessary, a suitable facility may not be available.

She related the many advantages of a Life Care Community such as Redstone Village. These include not being a burden to friends or family, estate preservation, control of unknown future health care costs, and guaranteed priority access to additional levels of care. She said Redstone Village does not look "institutional," but more nearly resembles a resort hotel or condominium community. Residents can begin with independent living and move to assisted living or specialty care (for Alzheimer's or Parkinson's, e.g.) when that becomes necessary. Redstone Village is a non-profit corporation run by an independent Board of Directors (who cannot live there).

In conclusion, Ms. Hinshaw reiterated her message of "Don't wait too long." For example, a person cannot get into assisted living when they are not mobile enough to get around on their own. Also, high-quality facilities are very limited—Redstone Village gives priority to those moving to higher care within their own facility. She recommends the following plan of action:

- 1. Get the necessary paperwork done, e.g. a will, a living will, a power of attorney, and a health-care proxy.
- 2. Tour all available facilities to see which one(s) you prefer.
- 3. Let your children know of your wishes.

She said she would welcome anyone who wishes to take a tour. Just contact her for an appointment.

In answer to questions, Ms. Hinshaw stated that most VA Offices are poorly trained in knowing what benefits are available to veterans and veterans'widows for senior care. She recommended *Still Serving Veterans* to give assistance in getting these benefits. In answer to another question, Ms. Hinshaw stated that there is currently a doctor in residence at Redstone Village, and as of May 1 Huntsville Hospital will have a clinic in operation there.

Announcements

President Tom announced that Tim Vanderveer's application for membership had been approved by the Membership Committee, and pending receipt of his membership fee will be formally announced to the Club for approval.

Fabiani Duarte reminded everyone about the **Healthy Living Day** festivities **tomorrow** (Friday, March 15) at Columbia High School in Research Park. Our JOOI Club at Columbia High School will be on hand to direct you to the school's gymnasium where there will be several demonstrations on healthy living. As reported last week, a (healthy) lunch will be available for only \$2.00. Plan to arrive at 11:00 a. m.

Fabiani also said he would be giving a report on the JOOI Club District Convention, held last weekend, at next week's business meeting.

Our guest speaker drew for the attendance prize. Bill Peters and Chev Kellogg both missed out, but Buddy Beck took home two weeks' worth of prize money on the third draw. Dr. Bill Clarke led in reciting the Optimist Creed to close the meeting.
