Opening

Committee Chairman Fabiani Duarte gave a glowing



report on the activities of various JOOI Clubs. He said he had visited with most of the JOOI Clubs in the last 2 weeks, and was very impressed and excited about what they have done and have scheduled to do. Examples:

The Lee High School JOOI Club has developed an anti-bullying campaign with several events throughout the week. Tomorrow, they will host an assembly with several programs, and later will release a "massive amount" of helium-filled balloons with containing anti-bullying messages. They have also produced their first TV video.

The Whitesburg JOOI Club will sponsor a donut sale at the end of the month.

The Columbia High School JOOI Club will host a carnival on May 16. They will raise money by incorporating a pig-kissing event in the carnival.

Students can vote, by donating money, to see which of a half-dozen teachers gets to kiss the pig. The teacher whose donations are the greatest wins the "honor."

Four JOOI Clubs will participate in this week's Panoply, helping Fabiani in the Global Village booth.

Finally, Fabiani reminded everyone of the upcoming JOOI Club Zone Convention at Lee High School. The date is Saturday, May 11, and the convention will last from 12 noon to 4:00 p. m. Up to 400 JOOI Club members could attend.

Bill Clarke reported on his attendance at the Meridianville Middle School's



Band concert, where he presented the Optimist Band Awards. He recounted how a mother of a student who used one of our instruments told him how the use of our trumpet had transformed his life. He became first chair in trumpet in the beginning band, and plans to make music his career. Without the loaned instrument this would not have been possible.

President Tom asked Tim Vander Veer and Alberto Duarte to come up front. Tom installed Tim as our newest member, and awarded Alberto the bronze sponsor pin (two more and he gets a gold one).

Program

Rev. Jim Berry introduced our speaker, Nell Berry, his wife of more than 60 years, and his grandson, James Bennett. James works for Earth Fair, the organization that recently provided a healthy living expo for our JOOI Club members.

Nell's talk was on "Heroes." Nell said the heroes she would tell about weren't those who made headlines, necessarily, but those who made something happen during their lifetime that benefited other people, especially those in need. Her heroes were:

- A 9-year old girl who had a dream to bring a water well to a village in Africa. Tragically, she was killed in an auto accident, but memorial gifts in her memory not only funded the well but also a school.
- One of her Teledyne Brown SHARE tutors at Morris Elementary School who not only kept in contact with the student after he left the program, but ensured he obtained a degree from the University of Montevallo.

- James Alexander "Brother" Bryan from Birmingham who dedicated his life to helping the down-and-out in Birmingham. There is a statue of him in Five Points South in Birmingham.
- Judge U. W. Clemon, who couldn't enroll in Birmingham Southern College because he was Black, but later received an honorary degree and delivered the 2003 commencement address at the college.
- Jimmy and Roselyn Carter for their work in advancing human rights throughout the world. Nell showed three videos describing the work done by the Carter Center. One of these showed the devastating effects of the guinea worm in Africa, and how the Carter Center has sponsored efforts that have eradicated them.
- Kimberly Mitchell, a Viet Nam orphan, who was reunited with the South Korean soldier who found her and saw her safely to an orphanage.

Nell closed her program by saying she feels strongly that the Optimists in the room were the same sort of heroes. Their work with children in many areas is just as impressive as the heroes she talked about.

Closing

Our speaker drew for the attendance prize, and Alberto Duarte won on the first drawing. Dr. Carl Winkler led in reciting the Optimist Creed.
