Program



Program Chairman Duane Plank introduced our speaker, and fellow Optimist member, Sheriff Blake Dorning. Sheriff Dorning is a member of our Club. He has been with the Sheriff's department since 1983, and was elected Sheriff for the

first time in 2002. In his introduction, Duane also recounted how our honoree for the Respect for Law banquet this year had been instrumental in solving a multi-state theft and embezzlement ring headquartered in Chicago.

Sheriff Dorning said his talk today would emphasize some aspects of the Sheriff's Department that were not generally known. He said the Madison County Sheriff's Department was a "full service" department, i. e., it deals with civil process, security, jail management, 24-hour patrols, K-9, narcotics, case investigation and prisoner transport. Many departments across the U. S. have only a select few of these. He said, "We take good people and empower them to do a good job.

Sheriff Dorning said he is very pleased with the new state-of-the-art communication system that has been functioning since last September. He can now reliably contact his deputies and other law enforcement personnel anywhere in the county, and in fact anywhere along I-65. These things were not possible with the more than 50-year old system that was replaced.

Another thing he is very proud of is the Homeland Security Group that is functioning in his Department. He has received several calls from Spencer Collier, Director of Homeland Security, to see if his group could assist in weather-related disasters, such as Hurricane Sandy and the recent tornados in Oklahoma. His group has the best response of those anywhere in the U. S. and has been copied by many other departments. The group has self-sustaining vehicles that can supply food and water for 3 days and travel as far as Colorado without refueling.

A final area described by Sheriff Dorning was the Chaplaincy Program. The cadre of Chaplains is made up of ministers and lay people who love the Lord. They travel 3 times each week with deputies on their patrols. They minister quickly to those who have experienced a traumatic loss, such as death. Another focus of the chaplains is to minster to the deputies themselves. The deputies are usually away from their homes and families during disasters, and this often weighs heavy upon them.

In answer to some questions raised in the Q & A time, Sheriff Dorning made these points:

- o Crimes in today's world are 95% related to drug or substance abuse. Thefts, burglaries and scams undertaken to feed a habit.
- o The budget for the Madison Count Metro Jail is \$16 million. It is by far the biggest expense in the County's overall budget.
- School boards should decide who should resist an armed intruder into local schools, albeit a police officer or a trained teacher. He said that the only way to stop such an intruder is for a good guy with a gun to take down the bad guy with a gun. The intent of the intruder is to kill, and no negotiation with them is possible.
- o All of the Sheriffs in the State were against the recent "gun bill" that permitted people to have weapons concealed in their vehicles in parking lots on private property. He considers this a violation of the 5th Amendment. He said legislatures should never turn a "right" into a "law."
- o Since 2005 many of the Department's patrol cars carry AEDs (automatic external defibrillators). Since the first life was saved that year, the AEDs have been warmly accepted by the Deputies.

Closing

Sheriff Dorning drew Tim Vander Veer's name first; Tim was absent so Tom Casteel won the attendance prize on the second drawing. Dr. Carl Winkler led the Club in reciting the Optimist Creed to close the meeting.
