Alberto also reported he had run into Mida Barnett, a former member of the Arab Optimist Club. Ms. Barnett said the Arab Club was being or had already been dissolved. An Arab Club member, Ken Gibbs, has traditionally provided the BBQ buffet for the Respect for Law banquet. Some of the Arab Club members had moved to Huntsville, and Alberto suggested someone recruit them to our Club.

### **Program**

Program Chairman Tim Vander Veer introduced our speaker for today, Ms. Susanna Leberman, Archivist at the Huntsville/Madison County Library. Ms. Leberman's talk was on the Occupation of Huntsville during the Civil War. Ms. Leberman began her talk by saying she was a true daughter of Huntsville; her father worked in the Space Program, and her mother was the daughter of a cotton farmer. She read what she said was her 30-minute talk, which she illustrated profusely with pictures from the Library's archives using a video projector.

Ms. Leberman said Antebellum Huntsville was quite the place, with every home in what is now known as the Twickenham District having a ballroom. The most famous citizen of that time was U. S. Senator Clement Clay. He participated in the walk-out of the Southern Senators, including Sen. Jefferson Davis, from the U. S. Congress in January of 1861. Later, Huntsville's Leroy Pope Walker became the Secretary of War under President Jefferson Davis in the CSA. President-to-be Davis toured the South on a tour with the Memphis and Charleston RR, and was roundly cheered at his stop in Huntsville.

Ms. Leberman walked us through, year-by-year, on what was happening in Huntsville during the Civil War. The city was occupied by Union soldiers for the great majority of the war years, with as many as 35,000 Union troops stationed here. The first occupation was by a Union army that marched south from Fayetteville, TN, in April of 1862. Near the end of the War in 1865, General William Tecumseh Sherman used Huntsville as a staging area for his march through Georgia.

Ms. Leberman made extensive use of archival material in her talk, quoting extensively from journals and letters of the period. Of particular interest were the quotes from Union soldiers who wrote letters home describing the beauty of Huntsville's homes and gardens as well as Big Spring and our surrounding hills. The city was likely spared massive destruction by Union troops because of its beauty.

Ms. Leberman closed by saying she had brought some books for sale for \$5.00 each. Proceeds from the sale of the book, *Changing Huntsville—1890-1899*, by Elizabeth Humes Chapman, go to support the Huntsville Historic Foundation, Inc. Several members bought a book or two.

## Closing

President George asked Ms. Leberman to draw for our attendance prize. The first name drawn was Guy Kubic, the second was John Inman. Finally, and at long last, she drew the name of Clyde Nevins, who took home the money (actually, I used the money to buy two of her books). Dr. Carl Winkler led those present in reciting the Optimist Creed to close the meeting.
