

Program



Vice President Vastell Williams reported that the Board of Directors had adopted a "fluid agenda" for the evening meetings. For tonight's meeting, Al Renz had volunteered to bring a presentation on JOOI Clubs, with emphasis on how to start a new one. It is hoped that members will step forward to help start a JOOI Club in a school once they "know the ropes."

Al began his presentation by showing a promotional DVD from Optimist International on JOOI Clubs. There are 17,000 youth in 650 JOOI Clubs in Canada, Mexico, and the U. S. A. There are three basic levels of JOOI Clubs:

- **Alpha Clubs**—kids aged 6 to 9. These clubs are in elementary schools. They are primarily run by the club's advisor
- **Junior Optimist Clubs**—kids aged 10 to 13. These clubs are aimed at kids in middle schools and junior highs. These clubs are run by the students with necessary guidance by the club's advisor.
- **Octagon Clubs**—Ages 14-18. These clubs are aimed at high schools, but can also be in middle schools. These clubs are run by the students themselves with only a little guidance from the club's advisor.

Al next showed the steps that are needed to start a JOOI Club at a school. He outlined the various meetings, the fees and expenses paid by our Club, the materials available to each JOOI Club, and the forms that are needed to be filled out. He stressed that in the membership form it is essential that the name, sex and birth date be provided for each member. This is required by OI in order to have a JOOI Club member covered by liability insurance.

Another thing Al stressed is the need to keep our terminology straight:

- **Advisors** are either teachers or counselors at a school who volunteer to work with the JOOI Club.
- **Coordinators** are Optimist Club members who work with the school to get a JOOI Club started, and then provide whatever assistance and support that will be needed during the school year.
- **Sponsor** is the Optimist Club of Huntsville.

Al completed his talk by giving some anecdotes about the JOOI Club started at Columbia High School.

Tom Casteel added some information on higher level JOOI Club organization. The JOOI Clubs have a District, much like a regular Optimist Club, and hold District Conventions annually. Our Club has voted to pay the expenses of JOOI Club officers to attend this Convention.

Closing

V.P. Vastell gave a tile with the Optimist to Al Renz, who promptly offered it to our prospective new member, Margaret Hall, who readily accepted it. Vastell asked Margaret to draw for the attendance prize. Just before she drew the name, Jim Berry, sitting nearby, said to her, "It's Berry, Jim Berry." Guess who's name was drawn? Right! Jim Berry!

Vastell led us in reciting the Optimist Creed to close the meeting.



NO MEETING - 5th Thursday

1. With the aid and approval of the school's Principal, recruit a teacher or counselor to be the JOOI Club Advisor.

Being JOOI Club <u>Advisor</u> is a volunteer job. He/she should be willing to spend additional, non-teaching time with the club. He/she should be energetic, enthusiastic, and optimistic. An information packet will be provided to the Advisor by the <u>Coordinator</u> from the Optimist Club of Huntsville (<u>the sponsor</u>). This will help the Advisor get started.

2. Recruit students to be members of the club.

The Coordinator will supply brochures, a bulletin board poster and a package of membership forms to help in the recruiting. A minimum of 8 members is needed to start a JOOI Club. I recommend 25 because history has shown that most of the clubs that fail started out with less than 25. Although it is not the most important thing, we do not get A&A points (3,000) unless the club starts with 20 or more. Each member is to fill out a Membership Application Form, which must be signed by a parent or legal guardian. The signed membership applications should be turned in to the Advisor. Dues for the club members will be paid by the Optimist Club of Huntsville, along with the Charter Fee and the Registration Fee. This should be emphasized to the members and the Advisor.

3. Choose a day, time and place for the Club to have its first meeting.

The day, time and place should be chosen by the club Advisor to be compatible with his/her schedule and and the availability of the students. The Coordinator should volunteer to lead the first meeting.

4. Hold the first meeting of the club to firm up the membership roster.

The first order of business should be to select a club name. The club name will generally include the name of the school, but it is not a requirement. Next fill out the Charter Application with the names of the charter members. The Charter Application along with the Member Applications should be given to the Secretary/ Treasurer of the Optimist Club of Huntsville.

Announce a time and place for the second meeting of the Club, at which time the Officers will be elected. New members added in the meantime can vote in the election and/or run for an office, provided they have been added to the membership roster. All members, including the Advisor and the Principal, will receive a JOOI Club pin, compliments of the Optimist Club of Huntsville.

5. Hold a second meeting of the Club.

At the second meeting of the club, officers will be elected. Typically, the officers elected are: President, one or more Vice Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer, and Historian. If desired, the Coordinator or other members of the Optimist Club of Huntsville can assist in the election process. After the election, fill out the Officer Information Sheet/Election Report form and give to the Secretary/Treasurer. The officers will receive an officer pin (different from the JOOI Pin), compliments of the Optimist Club of Huntsville. (the Historian will receive a VP pin since OI does not have Historian pins).

6. Have an installation ceremony for the club officer.

After the officers have been installed by a member of the Optimist Club of Huntsville, and installation ceremony may be held to honor the elected officers. The ceremony may be held immediately after the elections or at a subsequent meeting. The Optimist Club of Huntsville will provide cake and refreshments.

7. Conduct the first regular meeting of the club.

The Optimist Club of Huntsville will provide a custom made banner for the club, which will have the Club name on it.

Bylaws of the club should be the next order of business. The bylaws put in writing the duties of each officer and how the club should operate. A sample set of bylaws can be found at the Optimist International website: <u>http://www.optimst.org/Documents/JOOI_Suggested_Club_Bylaws</u>.


Finally and very important, the club should discuss and select projects that it will undertake during the School year. Examples of projects undertaken by other clubs include:

- a. Donut sale to raise money for a charity
- b. Talent show to showcase talent in the school
- c. Community Service Projects
 - (1) Manna House volunteering
 - (2) Collecting toys for Toys for Tots program at Christmas
- d. Marching in parades
 - (1) Veterans Day
 - (2)Thanksgiving or Christmas
- e. Tutor younger children

These are just examples. The club may consider any worthwhile project that benefits their school, their Community, or their Country.
