

George McDonough reminded everyone of the upcoming Zack Thompson Memorial Conference on **"Effective Medication Management for Older Adults."** He hopes to have a full house. He said Betty Thompson

will give a short talk about Zack, and he will tell about Zack's contribution to the Center for Aging. It will be held at the First Baptist Church's Life Center, Entrance #7, from **12:30 to 3:30 p.m. on October 16, 2015**.



Alberto Duarte announced that his two **JOOI Clubs** will be having their **Officer Installation Ceremonies** soon. The first one of these, for Randolph School, will be held next Tuesday, October 13, at 9:15 a. m. at the Randolph Upper School on Garth Road. Refreshments will be served, and he would like to see a good turnout of Club members to support this event.

## Program



October Program Chairman Alberto Duarte introduced our speaker for today, Mr. Richard Reynolds, who is Director and Principal of the school, a position he has held for 8 years.

Mr. Reynolds opened his talk by saying that the school has been a "North Alabama gem" for 48 years. It is not "just another private school." It is the only school of its kind between Nashville and Birmingham. The school focuses on K-12 education for students with conditions such as Autism, Asperger, Dyslexia, OCD, ODD and ADD/ADHDD. It is targeted for students from middle-class families with these learning difficulties from Huntsville and surrounding counties. Interestingly, some learning difficulties, like Autism, are more prevalent in highly educated families working in science, engineering or military; thus, Huntsville has a higher than average incidence per capita of students with these difficulties.

The school is located off of Governor's Drive, just behind Captain D's, in a building that is owned by the First Baptist Church. Currently, the FBC does not charge rent for the building occupied school, and the school's staff does all the maintenance on the building (Mr. Reynolds trimmed bushes before coming to the meeting). The FBC, however, has given notice that this arrangement will be over as of next May.

Typically, students with learning difficulties do not do well in large schools. Large schools, like Huntsville High with about 1,500 students promote anxiety about doing simple daily tasks such as getting what is needed from a locker and getting to the next class. What is needed, he said, is putting the students in an environment where "one size does not fit all." The school does not follow traditional trails. His students tend to not be good test takers, for example, and need a lot of help in how to get along with others. The school currently has 34 students, and charges a mere \$595 per month for tuition, with no contract, for each student. At times, even this low tuition is reduced for families experiencing financial difficulties. The school uses modern technology, and has 12 Dell Chromebooks which have programs to both diagnose and improve reading skills. The main objective is to "get kids to read well; then they can do anything." Mr. Reynolds says their goal is to make students want to learn and to become life-long learners.

Mr. Reynolds closed his talk by complementing our Club on the work we do for kids.

## **Question and Answer Session**

- **Q.** Jesse Lang asked where the school got its funding.
- A. Tuitions are the main source of revenue, but the school does get a few grants from civic organizations. The rent-free arrangement with the FBC is a big help, but that will be over next May.
- **Q.** Clyde Nevins asked about the number of classrooms and teachers at the school.
- **A.** There are four teachers and four classrooms at the school. There are no more than 8 or 9 in each class. The four classes are:
  - Young elementary (grades K thru 2)
  - Older elementary' (grades 3 thru 6)
  - Middle school (7 and 8)
  - High school (9 thru 12)
- **Q.** George McDonough asked if volunteers were used at the school.
- **A.** A few volunteers are used for tutoring, but they have to be screened to not be "helicopter" helpers; i. e., hovering over the student and doing everything for them.
- **Q.** Jim Berry asked if the school was a 501(c)3 organization, and if so, was it part of the United Way campaign.
- **A.** The school is a 501(c)3, non-profit organization, but not part of the United Way or Combined Federal Campaign fundraisers, mainly because the time and effort needed to join these campaigns are not worth the money received.

- **Q.** Al Renz asked about the school's total annual budget.
- **A.** It all depends, but generally ranges between \$200,000 and \$250,000. The budget is totally dependent on the revenue received, and varies because revenue is affected non-payment of tuition and the infrequent grants received.

## Closing

President Al gave a tile with the Optimist to Mr. Reynolds, who said he would display it prominently. Mr. Reynolds drew for our attendance prize, and the names of Jeff Sandridge and Matt Clarke were drawn before Jim Berry took home the money.


Dr. Carl Winkler led us in the reciting the Optimist Creed.
