Treasurer's Report



Treasurer Al Renz distributed the **financial report for the First Quarter**, the first three months of our fiscal year. For this period, our expenses exceeded our revenues by \$219.67. The deficit was due in part to outstanding payment for pecans

from our fundraiser, and in part due to outstanding reimbursement for meals for paying guests.

Youth Activities Expenditures were \$4,692.30 for the Band Instrument program, and \$1,085.84 for JOOI Club expenses. We currently have reimbursement requests to the Foundation of \$3,694.05.

The Bank Balance at the end of December was \$4082.42. With the reimbursement is received from the Foundation, the Club has a Potential Cash Position of \$8,384.36.

Treasurer Al reported that we chartered **3 JOOI Clubs** by the January 15 deadline. Grace Lutheran's JOOI Club has since submitted their charter paperwork and will be added next quarter.

Treasurer Al asked if everyone was clear on the new dues structure, and everyone nodded. Al said he wouldn't know for sure how the new dues structure would affect our finances until next quarter, but he is confident that it will prevent a deficit in our meal expenses.

Committee Reports



Jessie Lang thanked the several Optimists who came out last Saturday to put on the Club's **Tri-Star Basketball Competition**. Unfortunately, the contest could not be held because someone in

scheduled basketball games in the gym we had reserved for the event, and these games were in progress.

There was no option but to reschedule (or cancel) the event. President Al suggested that it might be better to hold the competition after basketball season was over. Jim Roe recommended that the Club cancel it for this year. The Board will take it up at next month's meeting.



George McDonough, chairman of the **Essay Contest**, reported he is "running a trap line" to recruit contestants for the essay contests. He has contacts in a home school association that he hopes will generate several. He said trying to get teachers to promote the program hasn't worked well. However, Vastel

Williams said that Ms. Elliot, his daughter's English teacher at New Century HS, is assigning everyone in her class the Optimist Essay topic so they could be entered in our contest. Marilyn King-Jordan said she has put our contests on her Face Book page.

Alberto Duarte said he has sent out a lot of emails and flyers for the **Oratorical Contest**, and has promoted the contest at the First Baptist Church. He has received confirmation from the Cooper House that we have the facility reserved for Saturday, March 5. There was some discussion on whether the contest could be moved from Saturday so Seventh Day Adventist kids could participate. The main problem on doing that, however, would be that the Zone and Regional contests would still be a Saturday, and they could not advance if they won.



Alberto Duarte reported that plans for the Club's **Pancake Breakfast** are moving along on schedule. He has distributed tickets to all the Club members. Ms. Tiffany at the Hawthorne Conservatory has told him her tickets are selling well. The Pancake Breakfast will be held on **Saturday, February 6**, at the Cooper House from 7:30 to 11:30 a.m. Alberto reported that

Club members have two options on how to return the money from their ticket sales (or not). You can write a tax-deductible check directly to the Hawthorne Conservatory, or you can give cash or a check to Al Renz and he will write a check to the Conservatory for the sum given him.



Tom Casteel announced that he still needs 3 more contributions for the OI Foundation's Dime-A-Day **program**. He would like to meet his pledge of ten before traveling to the District Meeting this weekend. The cost

Foundation President Alberto Duarte reported that the **Foundation's assets** as of yesterday were \$756,846.83 in our account at Regions Bank, plus a CD with First Commercial. He also reported that the Market is on a roller coaster, but our funds are not doing too badly. The Foundation Board will have their

quarterly meeting with Regions Bank today.
