#### **Treasurer's Report**



Treasurer **Al Renz** distributed the **financial report** for the Club as of June 30, 2016 (this report covers the first three quarters of our fiscal year). The Club's income has exceeded our expenses by \$1,393.26 for the period.

the amount would be nearer \$3,000 when Club members reimbursed the Club for meals eaten during the quarter. Youth Activities, especially the Band Instrument Program were the largest expenses. When the receivables from the Foundation and the receivables for meals is added, the Club's Potential Cash Position is **\$11,175.25.** The bank balance at the end of June was \$4,275.02

#### **Committee Reports**



**Alberto Duarte** reported that Bradleigh Herwig, our Club's District Award Winner, has not yet had her scholarship money sent to her chosen university on her behalf. Someone up the line has not sent in the needed forms to Optimist International. Bradliegh is enrolling in August and needs the money for tuition. Alberto is working the problem.



Foundation Chairman **Alberto Duarte** gave the **Foundation Report**. The Foundation's account at Regions as of June 16, 2016, was valued at \$860,437.76. This amount is after all of the reimbursements to the Club have been made. In addition, the Foundation's account at Synovus (an arm of First Commercial bank) was valued at \$149,715.95, up almost \$5,000 from the

amount invested with them after cashing our CD.

#### **Old Business**



Committee said she had scoured the city to look for a better place to eat than the 88 Buffet, and could find none that could meet our meeting time and keep the meal cost close to what we pay there. Her recommendation was to meet at the ORC and have meals catered (this has been coordinated with the manager of the ORC and is doable). A lot of discussion followed, which concluded:

- To have a meal catered to the ORC for 15 people (our normal attendance lately) would likely cost as much or more than we are paying at the 88 Buffet. A meal at there costs \$10.50 (with no drink) to \$12.75 (with drink) at lunch time, and \$14.25 (no drink) to \$15.50 (with drink) at our evening meeting.
- Sabrina, the caterer from Harvest would charge the Club \$15 per meal because of the small number of meals. She charged only \$12 per meal at the Youth Appreciation Banquet, but served about 100 meals which provided her a decent profit. Other caterers might do better on the cost and will be contacted.
- What could be served at meetings at the ORC would not necessarily have to be a full lunch, but could be similar fare to what we eat at Business Meetings—barbeque, Steak-Out, pizza, etc.
- It may be time for our Club to go to two meetings per month. Tom Casteel reported that most of the Optimist Clubs in our District meet only twice a month, and some only once a month. This will be pursued with the Board, and a survey of all Club members will be made.

**Richie Myers** moved that: "Beginning in August, the Club "dump" 88 Buffet for our Club's luncheon meetings and meet there only for the evening meeting (first meeting of the month). Until a better alternative can be found we hold all luncheon meetings at the ORC." **Alberto Duarte** seconded the motion, and it passed without dissent.



**Alberto Duarte** said he had a local music company give him an estimate on providing a quality electronic drum set and some keyboards to the Hawthorne Conservatory in memory of Duane Plank. He said he would prefer going to a local dealer, especially since they would provide a three-

year warranty on the items. He will present his recommendation soon.
