

President Vastell asked STEM Grant Committee Chairman Clyde Nevins to come forward for a special presentation. Newly inducted



28), with qualification competitions starting at 9:00 a.m., and finals in the afternoon at 1:30 p.m. Meridianville Middle School, one of our STEM Grant recipients, will be the only local school in the competition. Lunch will be available at the school.

Program



Our speaker for today's meeting was Mr. Joseph S. Vick, Museum Education Director and Homeschool Program Director for the U. S. Space and Rocket Center in Huntsville.

Mr. Vick has been with the Center for 10 year. After attending Space Camp twice as a youngster, Mr. Vick became enthusiastic about space, studied to be an educator and grabbed the opportunity to join the staff at the USRRC.

History: Mr. Vick began by giving a little history of the Space and Rocket Center. The Center was the brainchild of Wernher von Braun, and was dedicated on March 17, 1970. It is affiliated with the Smithsonian Museums and is the largest space museum in the world. The Center's outstanding Space Camp began in 1982, and has since graduated over 700,000 campers. About 20% of kids attending Space Camp come from foreign countries. Mr. Vick said there is no way to teach kids rocket science in one week, but they are taught the importance of math, science, teamwork and leadership. Many return to their homes and schools with a new love for education in these areas.

Currently: The Center is refurbishing many exhibits, especially the rockets and missiles in Rocket Park that badly needed repainting after decades of exposure to the elements. Next month, beginning February 21, a new exhibit will open that promises to be quite spectacular. It will be a multimedia presentation of our Solar System telling the properties of all the planets as well as the probes that have explored them.

Future: An extravaganza is planned for 2019 which will combine the 200th anniversary of Alabama as a State, and the 50th anniversary of the Apollo Moon Landing mission. Another long-range project is in work with Redstone Arsenal. When approved, this project will add about 1,000 acres of "green space" to the Center. This green space will connect with other green spaces in the area, and will feature hiking, walking and bicycle trails as well as rides (e. g., bungee jumping) appropriate to green spaces.

Closing

President Vastell gave our speaker a tile with the Optimist Creed, and then asked him to draw for the winner of our attendance prize. The first name drawn was Eureka Battie, a regular attendee.

By the way: Al Renz and I went through all the tags in the tin containing names for our attendance prize before the meeting to be sure no one's name was missing and no one's name was there more than once.
