President Eureka introduced or speaker for today, Ms. Vikki Moore, Advisor for the P. E. A. R. L.S. program in Huntsville. The acronym stands for **P**erforming **E**ducation and **A**cademics with **R**ealistic **L**ife **S**kills. It was founded by

two Huntsville City School educators in 2007 at Ed White Middle School to foster a mentoring environment that provides young ladies the opportunity to achieve in life. Eureka said her daughter, Alexis, is a member.

Ms. Moore gave a brief history of P.E.A.R.L.S. Starting with 11 young ladies at one school, it now has 21 members in several middle schools and high schools in Huntsville, mainly at Mae Jemison HS. She said it is considered an honor and a privilege to be a member. The organization performs community service projects in addition to getting training in life skills.

Young ladies from all the schools meet once each month, generally on a Saturday for mentoring and checking up on how they are doing scholastically and other goals in their individual programs. At the end of the school year, those girls who have met their goals are given a strand of pearls.

One of the P.E.A.R.L.S. programs emphasizes preparing HS seniors for college, with a "Home Sweet Dorm" program. Graduating seniors are prepared for college by a yearly college campus tour, and when leaving high school are given a personal package of items needed in their college dorm room.

Ms. Moore said the P.E.A.R.L.S. program has need of tutors and mentors, especially in the fields of nursing and engineering. Also, they would appreciate donations for items to stock their personal packages for the Home Sweet Dorm program.


